

New national magazine campaign began in July 2017. In Spring/Summer 2018, assess this campaign's impact by measuring PrEP awareness in the community.








1. What is Truvada® as PrEP?

Truvada® as PrEP, or pre-exposure prophylaxis, is the use of antiretroviral medication to prevent the acquisition of the HIV infection. PrEP is used by HIV-negative people who are at risk of being exposed to HIV through sexual contact or injection drug use. Truvada® as PrEP is a pill taken once daily that contains two HIV medications: Tenofovir and Emtricitabine. The combination of these two drugs, when used for PrEP, is called Truvada®. 2. How effective is Truvada® as PrEP?

When used consistently, Truvada® reduces the risk of contracting HIV from sex by more than 90%; and by 70% for injection drug users. Adherence to PrEP is essential; clinical trials have shown a positive correlation between

3. Who can prescribe Truvada® as PrEP?

Any licensed provider can prescribe Truvada® as PrEP. Specialization in infectious diseases or HIV medicine is not required. In fact, primary care providers who see members of populations at high risk of HIV on a routine basis are

4. What are the clinical practice guidelines?

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) provides comprehensive guidelines, including a Clinical Providers Supplement, for prescribing Truvada® as PrEP. The Clinical Providers' Supplement contains several tools for clinicians, such as billing codes, provider information sheets, patient/provider checklists, patient information sheets, a risk For more information, visit www.cdc.gov/hiv/pdf/prepguidelines2014.pdf.

5. What side effects may be experienced by patients?

Some patients will experience serious side effects including loss of bone density (1 in 100) or renal issues (1 in 200). More common side effects include: upset stomach, headache, vomiting, and loss of appetite. These side effects will typically fade during the first month of taking Truvada[®]. However, if a patient experiences side effects that do not go away within a month, the patient should notify his/her provider immediately.

6. What happens if my patient tests positive while taking Truvada® as PrEP?

Truvada® should be discontinued immediately if: 1) the patient becomes HIV-infected; 2) the patient experiences toxicity or symptoms that cannot be managed; or 3) the patient becomes pregnant.



are Re-Engagement

e who are diagnosed with HIV but not ined in HIV medical care are responsible for 2% of HIV transmissions¹. Successful engageent and retention in the HIV continuum of care ill help patients manage their health and keep neir viral load suppressed to an undetectable status, therefore reducing risk of transmitting HIV to another person.

Disparities in health care engagement and service gaps are affecting several key populations. The HHD will assist in re-engaging individuals by addressing other needs and/or barriers that may affect the patient's continuum of care and adherence to treatment.

What The Houston Health

- Using surveillance data to determine the care status of patients and sharing patient outcome reports with the provider;
 - The HHD is using Service Linkage Workers who will re-engage and link out-of-care persons back to HIV medical care and provide linkage to ancillary services;
 - Developing a secure and centralized data system to allow efficient tracking and reporting on the continuum of care model;
 - Expanding the Hi52Health Mobile app (developed by Baylor Teen Health Clinic) to assist patients with provider locations, and appointment and medication reminders.

- Become a Provider Partner
- We want to establish partnerships with a broad spectrum of HIV care providers in the Houston/ Harris County area who agree to provide a list of out-of-care patients to the HHD. The HHD follows strict compliance with federal and state laws governing Security/ Privacy/ and Confidentiality. You will receive regular outcome reports on the list of patients submitted.

Steps in the Process

- Provider signs a collaborative agreement with The HHD.
- Provider generates a list of out-of-care patients to share with The HHD.
- The HHD's Surveillance Investigators determine care status of referred patients through surveillance data.
- The HHD's Service Linkage Workers contact patients who are confirmed to be out of medical care and assist them with re-linkage to services.
- Information on patient status of care is compiled to share with the provider.

How does my office benefit from agreeing to submit our out-of-care lists?

You will receive regular patient status of care reports on all lists you submit. The HHD staff will review surveillance data and will go into the field to locate the patients. The HHD will also work to refer the patient back to your office or another provider, and link them to other services depending on their immediate or critical needs. (housing, food, financial, etc.)
